CHALICE CIRCLES COMING TO THE UU CHURCH

Also known as Covenant Groups and Small Group Ministry, Chalice Circles are a vital part of many Unitarian Universalist congregations. Now this grassroots movement is here to vitalize our own.

Congregation members and friends are invited to sign up for the program according to the day and time a group will meet. Groups are limited to eight to 10 participants. Although each group is led by a team of trained facilitators, the members work together to create a covenant to guide their discussions.

The primary objective of the Chalice Circles program is fellowship and spiritual growth. Whatever the topic, the conversation is respectful and caring and leads to greater understanding. In each session, all participants have an opportunity to share their perspectives, tell their stories and listen deeply.

The time together is structured: Groups begin and end with centering readings and often include a time of silence before the sharing begins. Many small groups engage in annual service projects, putting their values into action.

Most chalice circles have an "open enrollment" time once or twice a year and request a commitment of a year. After that time, the groups reform and begin again. There is no limit to the number of groups that can be formed in a congregation.

Enrollment for our congregation begins in October 2015; more information will be available soon.

PetSafe is the Change for Change Recipient for May and June.

There are times when individuals or families cannot care for their pets. Homes might be lost to natural disasters, adults may seek emergency shelter to escape domestic violence, or the pet owner may need medical care.

The PetSafe program, a community service offered by Purdue University's College of Veterinary Medicine, meets the short-term housing needs of these pets. PetSafe has successfully provided emergency shelter for approximately 15 pets per year since 1993 and has recently expanded to include pets affected by owners in hospice care.
