Dinner was courtesy of Amy French and Thai Essence, and offered a delectable choice of fried rice and two different curries. accompanied by copious amounts of wine and People's beer. And the desserts from Lorraine Myer filled an entire table.

After people had eaten, we got down to the real business of the night – the Live Auction. Jason Rubsam had us all laughing as he offered up a constant stream of lively banter and jokes while getting us to part with our hard earned money as we bid on more than 25 different items, including dinners, cooking lessons, garden compost, and homebrewed beer. ### **Take a Look >>> Transformation**

The day I turned 18, I went to get a tattoo. I chose a fairy because I collected fairy figurines as a child. But really, I chose it because I had known a young woman that I admired who had a lovely little fairy tattoo. It had some significance to me, but not much. Mostly I just wanted to get a tattoo because I could. And I later came to regret that one. Oddly enough, the other 3 tattoos that I got within the next year did not lead to regret but that first one, over time, seemed to fit me less and less.

Before my wedding, I decided it was time to cover it up. I would have professional photographs taken of me in a strapless dress and this tattoo that didn't really suit me would be a part of those memories. By that point, I had developed a strong theological affinity to birds. I was drawn to way they fly, letting the wind carry them. And to the way they represent faith in so many scriptures. And to the way they fly in formation, supporting each other on their journey. I loved the idea of covering one winged creature with another.

When I started researching which bird would take the place of my fairy on my shoulder I learned that bluebirds symbolize transformation. That sealed the deal for me. Because this new tattoo symbolized my own transformation in so many deep and important ways for me. It reminds me of how my theology has deepened and developed over

the years of my young adulthood. It shows me the ways in which I have flown, when I was able to trust my



wings – and also the ways that I have fallen when I have lost my faith or my direction.

For me, this image on my body is also the meaning of life. To heal, grow and become the best self we can so that we can create the best world we can for each other. This is my true purpose. I orient my entire life around this grounding. We are here to transform ourselves so that we might transform the world.

But it is a lot easier to talk about transformation than it is to actually do it. Change is hard. Changing ourselves is extremely difficult. Our behaviors and patterns become ingrained in us and shifting away from those that are unhealthy or problematic for us or those around us is an uphill battle. There is a reason 12 step groups talk about taking it one day at a time. Becoming our best selves takes dedication and daily effort.

Somehow, though, after years of working tirelessly on shedding the beliefs and behaviors that have held me back or gotten in my way, I have made significant progress. Celebrating my accomplishments towards growth and health help me to keep going on this long journey. When I can see how far I have come more than how far I have to go, I am propelled forward.

I am not entirely there yet.

Perhaps I will never reach
enlightenment. But I am on this
great journey of transformation. And
I have come so far. I am so much
stronger, braver and wiser than I
used to be. I believe in myself more
than I used to. I see my own worth
more than I ever have before. These
are no small things.

As we move through this coming month and explore the theme of transformation, I hope that we can all look at the ways in which we have evolved and grown in our lives. I hope that we can celebrate how we have stepped more fully into our best selves so that we can continue to move further and further along that path. I hope that we can support one another to continue our moves towards health and wholeness. We do not have to do it alone. Let me know how I might help you as you transform.
