# **MINISTER'S MUSE**

My searching friends,

I've always been a bit of a free spirit. I've even been called a wild child. Growing up, my mother would make me run circles around the car before we set off because it was hard for me to be confined in the car for too long. I often ran off to explore without letting anyone know where I was going. I loved to climb. I would talk to strangers. I was hard to control.

Yet, I excelled the most in my life when I had boundaries. When I knew exactly how far from the house I could explore, I found far more exciting trees to climb and forts to build within that space. Otherwise, I would keep moving outward and not find the heights and the depths that I found within my boundaries.

Knowing my parameters helped me to feel safe exploring all that was within them. We know this to be most true for children, but it is true for adults as well.

One of our Unitarian Universalist principles is the "free and responsible search for truth and meaning." We sometimes mistake this to mean that we can believe whatever we want. We know, however, that we are not free to believe that children are inherently sinful or that our GLBTQ neighbors are damned. We are not free to believe that other people's spiritual paths are wrong. We are not free to believe that our actions do not affect anyone but ourselves. The boundaries around our freedom of belief are often implicit, but they are very much real. We cannot believe whatever we want to believe.

Having these boundaries around our free searches for truth and meaning can be helpful. They help us to know when we are getting off track. They keep us close enough to our spiritual home that we can bounce what we find off of each other and continue to learn from each other. They let us cull the depths of what is within, rather than covering incredibly broad area but remaining on the surface. They do not limit our freedom, they enhance it. They allow us to revel in our searches. They invite us to find the truths that are already in our lives, to make meaning out of our personal experiences. They show us all of the beauty and wonder that is already a part of our lives, here and now. They bind us together as a people of faith, who believe different things but come together around shared values. Those shared values and our religious history provide us the boundaries that enrich our personal free searches for truth and meaning. They allow us to be free spirits. To let our hearts guide us. To remain spiritually open and to live in the questions.

As we move into this February's theme of Freedom, let us explore together where boundaries help to shape our experience of freedom. Blessings, Elizabeth
