Well, if anyone had told me ten years ago that within ten years I would hold a leadership position in a local church I would have assumed they were joking or maybe questioned their sanity (or both). Yet here I am. My wife Lorraine and I had been married in the UU Church by Libby Stoddard as a compromise. She was a divorced Catholic while I preferred a Justice of the Peace or equivalent. We then were absent for about twenty-five years from involvement in the UUC.

Our return to involvement was precipitated by Jim and Rosemary Leary initially through the Forum, then quickly blossoming from there. I identified a need in my first Art Fair for improvement in the data handling and was able to create a workable system for it which was used the following year and each Fair since. Apparently no good deed goes unpunished, so prompted I assume by the success of that, I was asked to take on the role of Assistant Treasurer which was a Board of Trustees office.

This position kept me involved to the degree that after a couple of years, I came to think that it would not be much of a leap to be involved in the Presidency, and became President Elect last year. It remains to be seen whether I was right!

Just what do I think that I can achieve in the President's role at this time? In the "Age of Trump", I believe that there is an opportunity to reach out to those who Jim Leary called "UU's who don't know that they are UU's". We can provide a safe haven and a sane world view for many of those who have been appalled by what happened in November and the history since.

To facilitate this, I plan to follow up strongly on Dorothy Hughes' great start this past year reorganizing and promoting Building Use. From a financial standpoint last year saw a more than doubling of the previous year's Building Use (235%) increasing this source of income by \$10,800 for the year. This income does not come free however. We will need to continue making the necessary arrangements and adjustments on scheduling, establishing fair market rates, assuring the rented spaces are ready and other things to assure that this income can be maintained.

While this income is great for our programs, I believe its greatest value is as a means of increasing our visibility and standing in the community as a place where good things happen. The more people who pass through our building, the more this word gets out.

Along with this great news is also the challenge of reduced pledges and payments. Part of this may be that we do not have enough convenient ways to contribute. This should not be surprising, since we have seen huge changes in how payments are made over the last couple of decades. Janice Kritchevsky is investigating alternative ways of contribution that would be more convenient, especially to the younger generations.

People who will spend hours and hours making sure we reach a consensus on an important policy. People who will fight in order to clean the toilets. People who care deeply about one another's pain. People who will anonymously re-carpet the hallway. People who will hold one another accountable with compassion. People who will find a solution to a technical problem even if it takes them hours, or days, or weeks. People who will share their vulnerabilities and their longings with some new woman who is only

We meet in the Fellowship Hall during cold or inclement weather and outside in nature on

People have come and gone over the years, always for good reasons, including Lisa who now lives in northern Indiana where she continues to teach Tai Ji Qigong. 
Puccini’s FUNdraiser

Congregational Meeting Update --May 7, 2017

Sunday, May 7 was the annual congregational meeting to elect new officers. The meeting was led by board president, Dorothy Hughes.

Outgoing committee on ministry chair, Ed Bowen provided an update on the sabbatical reentry plan including the reception planned for June 18 to say good bye to our sabbatical minister and a reception on July 9 to welcome back Rev. Davis.

Board Treasurer, Kevin Colby, gave a report on finances including a major concern about pledges. Although pledges are being paid, the total amount of pledges is approximately \$30K than anticipated. While we will naturally try to use any savings from underspent items in the budget or better than expected fundraising to make up for this, current projections show we are on track to end the year with a shortfall of about that amount. We will be looking to see if there are any ways we can tighten other spending to narrow that gap.

Board Assistant Treasurer, Janice Kritchevsky, reported on her initiative to set up a process for electronic payments of pledges. Research has shown that the convenience of electronic and auto withdrawal payments more than offsets the cost.

Jada Haughey gave a brief presentation on the importance of branding and unveiled the new logo created by our treasurer, Kevin Colby. The new logo will be used on all printed materials and the website.

Dorothy Hughes presented the slate of officers: Gary Burniske, president-elect, trustees, Joan Marshal & Brent Jesiek, endowment, Gary Mueller, nominating: Jenny Moss and Frank Arnold, committee on ministry Neelu Chawla and Sam Haughey. The motion was made, seconded, and passed for all candidates.

Dorothy Hughes thanked outgoing elected officers: Ed Bowen, committee on ministry; Eric Thiel, endowment; Lorraine Myer and Cindy Krulitz, nominating; and Mike Reed, Amanda Estes, and Bill Welge rotating off the board.

She also recognized 32 other leaders in the congregation who chair or co-chair committees or major events or fundraisers that keep the building, grounds, ministry and fellowship alive in this church. Below is a list of names. If anyone is excluded, it is not deliberate.
