Lighted Chalice

An Inspiring Idea

Jada presented the idea of UUCTC sponsoring the Roast Corn Booth at the annual Feast of the Hunters' Moon to Program Council, and then to the board of trustees for approval. Once she got the go ahead, Jada Haughey wondered what she was getting herself into. Her motivation, other than she is an annual participant at the Feast, was the large sum the church could potentially raise

down the booth. She relied, in part, on her network of friends and acquaintances who are regulars at the annual event. The first glitch was discovering a costume shortage. Jada immediately took action and organized sewing circles to work on filling in the shortage.

Jada engaged friends who

and volunteer sign up. She also solicited volunteers through UUCTC communication methods.

At a Program Council meeting it was decided to ask Jay Melosh, a congregant and artist, to make a sign that would fit in with the historical period the Feast celebrates.

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Minister in Motion By Rev. D. Charles Davis



On October 14 I stood with members of several faith communities and we honored the memories of those who were shot and killed in Las Vegas as well as anyone else who has been killed or harmed by violence in our society.

It caused me to reflect upon the source of all violence. To me it is the notion that "Might makes right!" Authority is enforced from the top down. In this version of Judaism, Almighty God has the right to ask Abraham to kill his own son. In this Version of Christianity Almighty God has the right to impregnate Mary against her will so he can kill her son as a sacrifice to satisfy himself. I was raised in a more loving version of the Judeo-Christian tradition. A loving god provided Abraham with an alternative to human sacrifice. God provided Joseph to care for Mary and her child even though Jesus was not his own In this version of the

story "Right makes Might" Jesus died in weakness but the righteousness of his teaching lives on. Love for all is a universal message available to everyone.

I call those who believe "Right makes might." the righteous. I call those who believe "Might makes right." the mighteous. They might just kill you if you disagree with them.

When it come to our politics are we mighteous or righteous? The mighteous strategy seeks political advantage by any means necessary so that one can force one's agenda through the legislature so it can be enforced by the executive branch and sustained by the judicial system. The mighteous strategy picks winners and punishes losers. The righteous strategy tries to convince people to do right it urges them towards positive feelings of love and empathy It seeks practical

solutions that benefit all

Violence is used so that the winner takes all. Non-violence assumes that everyone deserves a share. That is what makes the righteous path so difficult. It is hard to play for a tie when the other person is trying to win. Imagine dancing. Two people do not dance well together if one partner is trying to make the other partner look bad. When I counsel couples planning to marry I warn them, "Do not try to win an argument with your spouse, for if you do then you are married to a loser." Too many things in life are treated like a competition. We should focus on doing right and do not let the mighteous tempt us to fight. When we focus on defeating others we plant the seeds of violence. Our strategy must be to share a positive message that benefits all. We know for certain that attack will bring about counterattack. The question is not, "Do we have the courage to fight?" The question is, "Do we have the courage to trust a slight possibility that love will bring their defenses down?"


The foregoing condensed table shows revenues and expenditures through the end of September. In addition to the operating deficit of 14,000, we spent all of the 16,800 in a fund for a sabbatical minister and over 3,000 in an RE Reserve toward the RE-visioning project.

The budget for staff costs includes 7,700 for a Choir Director and 6,100 to start a new sabbatical fund. Nothing has yet been spent in either of those accounts. If they are deducted from the budget, staff costs are close to 74% and total expenditures 72%. So in the absence of these two line items, expenditures are running close to budget over the first nine months of 2017 and total expenditures for the year would be about 262,500

The shortfall in revenues relative to budget is primarily because the pledge income budget of 227,300 was based on experience in recent years. However, actual pledges in 2017 are only about 194,000. Unless new pledge income emerges before the end of the year, total revenues will be about 244,000 and net revenue for the year will be about -18,500, assuming nothing is set aside to start a new sabbatical fund.

The bottom line is that without an increase in pledge income of 10 to 15 percent from 2017 to 2018, the current level of budget expenditures does not appear to be sustainable.



As a participant now, I sing with the French Voyageurs who assist with the Catholic service on Sunday mornings. The Voyageurs were French fur traders who came down from Canada and traveled into the wilderness alone with a Catholic priest once a year, during the original "Feast".




