For some time now, the Board has been aware that the roof of the church will eventually need significant repair. In preparation for this, the **Building and Grounds** committees have begun the process of getting estimates for this work. Not surprisingly, preliminary estimates indicate that the cost of the needed roof repairs far exceed what we have budgeted for building maintenance. Ordinarily, this type of expense would be financed using capital reserves. Unfortunately, our reserves have dwindled over the last several years as we have struggled to balance our yearly budget. Fortunately, we have time to act. In the coming months, the Board will be looking into our options. Our building is our congregational home. Ultimately, we must work to strengthen our capital reserves in order to preserve our home for the years to come.

## **Summer Religious Exploration: Planting Seeds of Justice**

Food self-sufficiency is a key to building sustainability, in this country and around the world. # UU CHURCH NAME CHANGE FOR MARKETING/ SOCIAL MEDIA PURPOSES

The official name of our congregation is "Unitarian" Universalist Church, Inc." This is not specific enough for marketing. For marketing purposes we are trying to add a locator to our name. We want this to be unique and specific. "Greater Lafayette," which has been used in the past, is not unique because there are so many Lafayettes. "West Lafayette" is too specific, as it excludes people from outside of West Lafayette. "Tippecanoe County" may be the right balance of uniqueness and specificity. For a trial period, beginning immediately and ending in December 2014, we will be increasingly using the name "Unitarian Universalist Church, Tippecanoe County" in our outreach. Gavin spoke at his bridging ceremony last spring and is currently working at Wabash Center. Nathaniel will do his bridging this year and would like to major in sociology. Roxanna, the eldest, plans to return to IUPUI in the fall. Their father deserted the family when Roxanna was 10. They have not seen nor heard from him since, but their RE program and UU involvement has helped with this incredibly difficult situation. For this stability Lola is very grateful.

Lola is a Lafayette native. She married at barely 18 and has held a variety of interesting jobs since then, including many years in radio—as a copywriter and voice-over talent. She's also done free-lance work for the Journal & Courier, has written for several magazines and ad agencies, has held several interesting positions at Purdue, and is currently in IT data entry for Lafayette Savings Bank.

Lola lives in Lafayette with her son and four rescue cats. An avid reader, she is passionate about animal rights and animal welfare, loves Purdue women's basketball, opera, and politics, and is trained in crisis intervention, having spent five years as a volunteer and trainer at the Lafayette Crisis Center.

Lola has lived a fascinating and unusual life. She still writes to the pen pal she acquired at the age of 11. She attended James Dean's funeral in 1955, and over the years, three of her closest friends have been murdered. If she's feeling down, she often puts in a DVD of Jim Carrey's *Liar*, *Liar* or possibly some Monty Python.

What would you want if all of the sudden were taken to the Intensive Care Unit of the hospital? Does your family know? Does anyone know? If you were headed into major surgery and someone would need to "speak" for you afterward even for part of a day...or longer.....would s/he know what to say?

There are a million reasons to avoid having the conversation. "I'm not sick!" "I'm too young to think about things like this." "I'm living to 100!" or

"I just don't know how to get the conversation started......it's uncomfortable."

We'll have documents to lead the process, a facilitator from A-REC to manage the time, a couple of short videos, personal stories, activities to help identify our wishes and time to share (if we wish) our thoughts, ideas and questions.

The Conversation Project was started by Ellen Goodman (Pulitzer Prize winning columnist) and colleagues after experiencing the confusion, pain and grief of trying to help a family member or friend during a critical time....not knowing what the person really wanted. They vowed to let someone know their wishes so the same thing wouldn't happen to others they loved. In doing so they decided to share what they learned and tools for having much needed conversation. They (and we) believe that the place for this to begin is at the kitchen table (or on a walk, or wherever) with the people we love, before it's too late.
