FORUM, 9AM Eileen J. Kladivko, Ph.D., Purdue University Agronomy Department: *Crops and Soil Health*. Long-term sustainability of our soil resources is important for current and future generations. Soil health is a concept used to describe the biological, chemical, and physical conditions of the soil that lead to greater productivity and resilience in our agricultural systems. Cover crops are one way that farmers can improve soil health, and there has been a great increase in their use over the past few years. This presentation will describe some basic concepts of soil health and cover crop use in agriculture in Indiana. Dr. Eileen J. Kladivko is Professor of Agronomy at Purdue University, where she teaches and does research and extension work in soil physics, soil biology, and soil management. Her research studies have included cover crops, soil health, earthworms, no-till, and drainage and water quality over the past 32 years. She is a founding member of the Midwest Cover Crops Council.

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

DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION PROGRAM, IN WEST LAFAYETTE, IN

Position Opening: This is a three-quarter time (30 hours average per week) position at the Unitarian Universalist Church, Tippecanoe County, Indiana. Additional information about this church and its congregation can be found at: http://www.uuctc.org/.

Qualifications: The candidate for the Director of Religious Exploration (DRE) should be a self-starter who works well with children of all abilities, as well as volunteers, families and church staff. The candidate should have experience working independently and collaboratively in teams, and some experience supervising others. Unitarian Universalist background and familiarity with UU religious exploration is preferred. Some religious education leadership is a plus, as is interest in developing music as an aspect of the Religious Exploration Program.

Accountability: The DRE is hired by and reports to the Board of Trustees, is supervised by the Minister, and works closely with the RE Support Team and other lay leadership to review the process and quality of the Religious Exploration program.

Responsibilities: This 30-hour/week position requires an onsite presence at least three Sundays per month, with responsibility for ensuring full RE programming on the other Sundays. The DRE will supervise and support child care staff, RE class team leaders, teachers, and other RE volunteers. Hours also include daytime hours, weekly meetings with the Minister, some evening meetings and special events. Weekday and onsite hours and specific days off are flexible, and set in coordination with the minister and/or board of directors.

To apply: Applicants should submit a letter of interest and a resume to Unitarian Universalist Church, Tippecanoe County; 333 Meridian Street; West Lafayette, IN 47906; by August 31, 2014. Applications received before this date will receive full consideration, although the position may remain open until filled.

DRONE QUILT PROJECT UU CHURCH, LAFAYETTE CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN & LAPC CO-SPONSORS

Lafayette Area Peace Coalition (LAPC), Unitarian Universalist Church & Lafayette Church of the Brethren are co-sponsoring the Drone Quilt Project. Quilts from the Drone Quilt Project will be on exhibit with an opening reception held at the West Lafayette Public Library on **Friday, September 5.** The exhibit will continue through Friday, September 12.

The Drone Quilt Project was created to acknowledge the deaths caused by U.S. drone strikes and to memorialize the victims. As many as 948 civilian deaths in Pakistan alone, including nearly 200 children, have been reported, according to the Bureau of Investigative Journalism. Unidentified victims are remembered through words such as "Unnamed Woman" or "Beloved Grandfather." Others are identified by name. Together, these fabric squares are sewn together by volunteers to create the quilts. There are four quilts measuring 66 in. X 66 in. that have been created by Veterans for Peace. The Drone Quilt Project is complemented by informational panels, which share information about U.S. drone policy and those it directly affects. It was first shown in Madison, WI in August 2013, and has since traveled to locations in Iowa, Maine, Ohio, Virginia, Washington DC as well as Bloomington, Martinsville and Plainfield, Indiana. "The important thing to remember is that each victim was a human being, with hopes, dreams, plans, friends and family. We hope that the Drones Quilt Project will help us remember that we are all the same—we are not worth more, and they are not worth less. We all have value," said one of the volunteers. THE TWENTY MINUTE TUNE-UP CONTINUES!

Please join us for this Taoist Immortal Internal Exercise 6 Week Class taught by Master Jason Argos. The next session begins Thursday, August 28 through October 2, 2014, 11;15 a.m. to 11:45 a.m., UUC Room 101/103. \$48 for 6 classes, to be paid at first class. Exercise level set for seniors; all ages welcome. During the first 20 minutes Master Argos will guide you through 16 exercises from the book, "Xing Yi Nei Gong" by Tim Cartmell (book is recommended but not required). As you become familiar with the 16 movements Jason will share more Nei Gong from his decades of Xing Yi study. Xing Yi and bone marrow washing, brought to China by Bodhidharma, has been passed down from ancient times. Possible benefits of this practice include:

- •Removes toxins and increases bone mineral density
- Eases arthritis symptoms
- •Improved cardiopulmonary fitness
- Normalizes blood pressure
- •Deeper, more restorative sleep
- •Maximizes digestion, reduces appetite, reduces waistline
- •Improves balance and reduction of falls
- •Improves immunity
- •Builds core strength and speeds recovery time
- •Improves whole body-mind coordination

DREPUNG GOMANG MONASTERY SACRED ART TOUR VISIT

Visiting Tibetan Buddhist Monks from the Drepung Gomang Monastery in South India, sponsored by the Adult Religious Exploration Council and hosted by the church, will construct a Green Tara Sand Mandala on the sanctuary altar stage from Wednesday, September 3 through Wednesday September 10. The opening ceremony will be at Noon on Wednesday September 3.

"The goddess of universal compassion, Tara represents virtuous and enlightened action. It is said that her compassion for living beings is stronger than a mother's love for her children. She also brings about longevity, protects earthly travel, and guards her followers on their spiritual journey to enlightenment.

Green Tara (Sanskrit: Syamatara; Tibetan: Sgrol-Ijang), filled with youthful vigor, is a goddess of activity. She is the fiercer form of Tara, but is still a savior-goddess of compassion. She is the consort of Avalokiteshvara and considered by some to be the original Tara. Like Avalokiteshvara, the Green Tara is believed to be an emanation of the "self-born" Buddha Amitabha, and an image of Amitabha is sometimes depicted in Tara's headdress."
