Looking Through the Johari Window

The past year has been an exercise in poor communication, which has resulted in anger, sadness, and a lack of trust. When faced with such events, I find it helpful to review thing I thought I knew but somehow let slip away. 35 years ago when I was in college, I was introduced to the concept of the Johari window.

This concept

ask a trusted friend "How did I come across in the meeting? " You may have been trying to be clear and kind, but your actions and the words you said might have seemed opinionated and patronizing. You may have been confused and merely asking a clarifying question but your tone and your manner appeared to be showing the work behind them. One must be willing to let people behind the facade if you wish them to understand how you came to your conclusions. If our facade is not supported by an underlying truth we are as false as a movie set that is only the facades.

Sometimes there are things that are

unknown to everybody in a situation. In our case, there may be systematic flaws in the sabbatical system that enhance tensions between congregations and ministers. How were our personal conversations impacted by the national polarization, hostility and volatility? There may have been forces at play in our conflict

that were bigger than any of our actions or intentions.

Sometimes when we are going through a difficult time we are tempted to say, "It is what it is." The Johari Window suggests that nothing ever is only what it is. Our actions require self examination. It is the only way we can learn from experience.

We assume that all communication is in an open arena where everything is known to everybody. But we should always be aware of the other three quadrants in the window.

First is our own blind spot. There are things about ourselves that others perceive or know that interfere with our communication. By definition it is hard to see one's own blind spot. After a meeting, it might be good to subversive and mean spirited. Finding one's blind spot requires being able to hear uncomfortable truths about oneself and having a friend brave enough to tell you .

Naturally, we always try to present our ideas in the best light. So there is always some information we leave out. There is always a facade. Sometimes its is just expressing our conclusions without

Introducing your Healthy Communities Team in 2009, the church adopted the Covenant for a Healthy Community to help us better manage conflicts within the congregation. You can find a copy

of the Covenant on the church website at <u>www.uuctc.org/</u> <u>policies/conflict-</u> <u>management-</u> <u>procedures-and-</u> <u>guidelines.</u>

The Covenant outlines a set of steps that we as UUs should follow whenever we find ourselves in conflict with other members of the

congregation. The first step, of course, is direct dialogue, which at its essence means face-to-face communication. In other words, we should avoid trying to hash out problems via social media or by discussing them with third parties. If you have a conflict with someone, talk to them about it in person.

If that doesn't work, whether your conflict is with a fellow

congregant, a committee, or a member of the staff, then you should contact the Healthy Communities Team for assistance.

The Healthy Communities Team is a committee within the church



whose sole purpose is to help manage interpersonal conflicts between people in our congregation. The members of the committee are:

The Healthy Communities Team will do their best to listen carefully to what you have to say, to try to understand the nature of the conflict. and to make recommendations on how they might be able to help. This could include helping you to clarify your own understanding of the conflict and helping you to prepare for a face-to-face meeting with the person or people you are in conflict with. Where appropriate, the Healthy Communities Team might also connect you with a neutral mediator to help manage the conflict.

So get to know your Healthy Communities Team, and please don't be afraid to approach them if you find yourself in conflict with someone else in the congregation.

UUCTC has ten Fellowship Teams that prepare coffee and snacks for before and after service, arrange tables and chairs, and provide cleanup of Fellowship Hall before and after Sunday service. The teams rotate, with each team being in charge about four times per year. In addition, they also are responsible for the monthly pot-luck if their team is on duty the week of pot-luck (usually the first Sunday of the month). The Coordinator develops the schedule, trains leaders, and keeps all informed of any changes in procedures that may impact fellowship teams.

Professor William Martin ("Marty") Becker, age 94, passed away at Countryside Meadows in Indianapolis on March 30, 2018. Marty was born in 1923 in Philadelphia. His parents, Jacob and Annie Becker, were Jewish garment workers who immigrated from Ukraine to escape religious persecution. During the 1930s, the

The Unitarian Universalist Church of Tippecanoe County ("The family moved to Sunrise Cooperative Farming Community, a kibbutz near Saginaw, Michigan. After the closure of Sunrise, the family moved to Jersey Homesteads (later called Roosevelt, New Jersey), a farm and factory community created under the New Deal to resettle Jewish garment workers.

During World War II, Marty entered the U.S. Army, serving as a radio repairman in Northern France, Belgium, and Western Germany, and earning the Victory Medal and other honors. His military experience kindled Marty's interest in science. Following the war, he earned a PhD in physics at Purdue, where he later became a faculty member. In addition to teaching Purdue students, Marty was one of the originators of the Physics Funfest, an annual show that introduces

Church") exercises its right under Indiana law to protect the safety and sacred solemnity of its spaces. The possession, use, or distribution of any explosives, guns, or other deadly or dangerous materials or weapons reasonably deemed capable to cause bodily injury are prohibited on the premises of The Church. Persons discovered to be in violation of this policy will be asked to leave the premises under criminal trespass provisions in Indiana State Law. Exempted from this policy are sworn police officers and retired thousands of children to physics. Marty retired from Purdue in 1990, but remained involved in physics education, performing science demonstrations at elementary schools throughout Indiana.

Marty was an active member of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Tippecanoe County and a volunteer for numerous local organizations. He enjoyed fatherhood, opera, playing the piano, ballroom dancing, astronomy, long walks and scientific discovery. Marty is survived by his wife Barbara Becker, his children Jackie, Anna, David and Julie, and numerous grandchildren and great grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 5 at University Place, 1700 Lindberg Road, West Lafayette.
