A Calming Presence by Neil Myers

The UU Church has hosted the West Lafayette Zen Group since February, 2008. We meet Thursdays from 6-7 PM and Saturdays from 8-10 AM in the Meditation Room, practicing Buddhist meditation in the Japanese Soto Zen tradition. We welcome anyone who wants to join us. The following piece describes how the group began 50 years ago. Its author, Neil Meyers, was one of our founding members; he is a poet and retired professor of English at Purdue

In the fall of 1967-68, Sanford Goldstein, a Purdue English Professor who also taken two year stints teaching English at the University of Niigata, invited a Japanese Zen teacher he had met there to visit the U.S. and stay in his family's home in West Lafayette.


Sekiun Koretsune Sensei, who taught courses at Niigata in Education & Psychology, though his basic subject was Zen, arrived. He did an undergraduate degree in Philosophy at a Japanese university, then entered Eigen-ji, a Rinzai monastery, in Kyoto. He was a follower of Hoseki Hisamatsu, a legendary Zen teacher, and a founder of the 'Kyoto School.' This Rinzai-oriented group was attempting to 'modernize' Zen by re-interpreting it in western terms, emphasizing philosophical approaches rather than traditional practice.

Sensei spent the fall and early winter of 1968 in West Lafayette, introducing many of us to Zen. His presence was startling. He wore his robes everywhere, his manner and his formal talks were lively, witty, learned, unpredictable and often baffling, both because of his love of paradox and his Japanese accent. He spoke frequently at Purdue and in the area at churches, small community gatherings and weekly discussion groups at the Goldstein's house; he was invited to Wabash, IU, in Chicago, and to MIT in Boston. We found him warm, accessible, enormously intelligent, and fascinating. By the end of his visit, we had been introduced to Zen in an unforgettable way.

In 1970, we invited Sensei back more formally for a year's stay in Lafayette. We had a basic position for him as a visiting lecturer in Fine Arts at Purdue, with courses possible in other departments, wherever there was interest. The Vice-President for Student Services offered a small grant. We were on the way.

When Sensei arrived, he settled in at the Goldstein's, and eventually had

an office at Purdue where he could do zazen, study, answer mail, interview students, etc. He spoke widely on Zen, handled study groups, and taught a formal undergraduate course in Philosophy on Nishida, a major Japanese thinker who had reinterpreted Zen as a philosophical system. That spring Sensei co-taught an English course, 'Zen & Literature' which was enormously lively as it brought out essential points. When Sandy Goldstein's wife, a Professor of Sociology, fell seriously ill, Sensei took over her course for two months, calling it 'Zen and Sociology' as well as teaching courses in calligraphy, Tea Ceremony and flower arranging. He was impressed by American students and commented often how Zen was moving west. During the last week of his Zen & Literature course, he spent time exploring the intricacies of transferring a great spiritual tradition from one cultural context to another.

The meditation group began that year. Several campus ministers invited Sensei to lecture. Sensei began giving weekly evening talks at the Wesley Center. Initially, simply lecture discussions around a table, but they evolved as he gradually realized, in contrast to contemporary Japanese, Americans were intensely interested in actual practice, particularly in zazen. In the spring these discussion groups began to incorporate meditation.

Sensei showed us posture and breathing, then, without saying anything about what to do with our thoughts, he had us sit facing the center, Rinzai style, while he rang a bell, then for forty minutes walked quietly before us holding his formal kyosaku straight up in the air. As the semester went on, more and more people appeared. The unexpected happened regularly. He gave us a koan, 'what is your true self'; told us an anecdote of three monks meditating at a sheer cliff edge, and when one fell off, another simply remarked, "Oh he was very careless." When someone was nodding, he made us jump by screaming, "DON'T SLEEP!" then explained quietly that we weren't dealing with daydreaming but with the human soul. What once sounded like a thunderclap was Sensei using his kyosaku to create, for an instant, the loud indoor sound.

Toward the end of his visit, the core group of Sensei's followers converged for weekly meditation. Before he left, we promised to keep the group going. Five to fifteen of us met at the Wesley foundation for about five years. Many were Sensei's former students; gradually others appeared. Eventually we moved to another religious center, then for at least ten years met regularly at member's homes. There were no announcements; people simply heard about the group, and when interested, joined in.

People from our group began going to other places to study and learn more about other types of meditation from other teachers. During the two years in the early nineties when Masao Abe taught courses in Zen at Purdue, we reconstituted the original group -- Wednesdays, seven-thirty, 40 minute sitting followed by the chanting, and a short reading. We used a room in the basement of University Church and began putting up posters, bought a bell, Xeroxed copies of the four vows, and that was it. At first only a few people would show up, but they were enough. The dharma had legs. We were once more on our way.
